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# A Critical Analysis of *al-Ḥiyal al-Syar'iyyah* Concept within the Ḥanafī School Paradigm: Implications and Implementation in Contemporary Financial Transactions

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#### Abstract

This study examines the concept of *al-hiyal al-syar'iyyah* (permissible legal stratagems) from the Ḥanafī school of thought perspective and its application in contemporary financial transactions. The research aims to analyze the Ḥanafī schoolars' views on *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* and explore its implementation in financial contracts (*mu'āmalah māliyyah*). Employing a qualitative approach with normative and sociological perspectives, this study focuses on textual analysis of classical and modern Islamic jurisprudence sources. The findings reveal that the Ḥanafī school considers *al-hiyal al-syar'iyyah* as a legitimate method to navigate religious matters without violating Islamic law, categorizing it into permissible and impermissible stratagems based on their objectives and alignment with *maqāṣid al-sharī'ah* (objectives of Islamic law). The study also demonstrates the application of this concept in various financial contracts, including sales, leases, loans, gifts, and contemporary Islamic financial products. This research contributes to the ongoing discourse on Islamic legal theory and its practical implications in modern Islamic finance, providing valuable insights for academics, policymakers, and practitioners in the field.

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

Islam, as a comprehensive belief system, encompasses various aspects of human life, including *mu'amalah* in social and economic interactions.<sup>1</sup> Through the shari'ah brought by the Prophet Muhammad, Islam establishes an ethical and legal framework that governs human behavior, including the concepts of halal and haram in transactions and interpersonal relationships. The Qur'an, as the primary source of Islamic law, sets forth the fundamental principles of *mu'amalah*, which are then elaborated upon through the hadiths of the Prophet Muhammad. The Islamic legal paradigm acknowledges a spectrum of normativity, encompassing clear categories of halal or haram, as well as gray areas (shubhat) that require further ijtihad (legal reasoning).<sup>2</sup>

The fundamental objective of Islamic law *Maqāṣid al-Shari'ah* is to realize the well-being *maslahah* of humankind, both in this world and the hereafter. *Shari'ah* serves not only as a legal and ethical system but also as a comprehensive framework for addressing various societal challenges faced by both Muslims and non-Muslims.<sup>3</sup>

A comprehensive understanding of Islamic law necessitates a multidisciplinary approach that integrates textual analysis of authoritative Islamic sources with contextual considerations and a deep understanding of the *Maqāṣid* (objectives) of Islamic law.<sup>4</sup> As articulated by al-Rumānī (1415 H), Islamic law is intrinsically designed to optimize benefits *jalbu al-maṣālih* and mitigate harms *dar'u al-maṭāsid* for humanity.<sup>5</sup>

An interdisciplinary approach to Islamic law demands a critical examination of primary sources, a sophisticated understanding of legal methodology (uṣūl al-fiqih), and a comprehensive grasp of the socio-historical contexts and contemporary applications of Islamic legal principles.<sup>6</sup>

The Islamic studies paradigm posits that every precept and prohibition found in the Qur'an and the Sunnah of the Prophet Muhammad is designed to serve specific purposes (maqāṣid) that contribute to human flourishing. This understanding aligns with the Islamic teaching that the Prophet's mission is a manifestation of universal mercy, as evidenced by the Qur'anic verse, Surah al-Anbiyā' 107, which states:

وَمَآ اَرْسَلْنٰكَ اِلَّا رَحْمَةً لِّلْعُلَمِيْنَ

"And We have not sent you, [O Muhammad], except as mercy to the worlds."

The verse emphasizes the Prophet Muhammad's pivotal role as a manifestation of universal divine mercy. According to 'Abd al-Raḥmān ibn Nāṣir al-Sa'dī's (2002) commentary "Taisīr al-Karīm al-Raḥmān fī Tafsīr Kalām al-Mannān," this verse underscores the Prophet's function as the bearer of the Qur'an and as a conduit of God's mercy to humanity. Al-Sa'di highlights the contrasting human responses to this divine gift: the believers who accept it with gratitude and the disbelievers who reject it (p. 621).8

This perspective offers a theoretical foundation for understanding the ethical and social dimensions of Islamic law, which aims to realize universal well-being. By delving deeper into this concept, scholars can gain valuable insights into contemporary Islamic legal studies and its relevance to addressing pressing global issues.<sup>9</sup>

The field of usul al-fiqh has witnessed considerable debate over various methodologies of legal derivation (istinbat). A particularly controversial concept in this field is *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah*, which is associated with the Hanafi school and its founder, Imam Abu Hanifah. In

Etymologically, *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* denotes strategies aimed at achieving specific goals through indirect means.<sup>12</sup> In Islamic jurisprudence, this concept entails the modification or circumvention of legal rulings, which may potentially contravene the overarching objectives of Islamic law *maqāṣid al-syarī'ah*. While the Shafi'i, Maliki, and Hanbali schools generally prohibit such practices, the Hanafi school views ḥiyal as a legitimate tool for mitigating legal burdens and enhancing the effectiveness of Islamic law.<sup>13</sup>

The Ḥanafī school is well-known for its adaptive and rational approach to Islamic law,  $^{14}$  which allows the use of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* to address new challenges in various aspects of life, including financial transactions. This concept reflects the efforts of Ḥanafī scholars to uphold the principles of *sharī'ah* while adapting to the ever-changing needs and dynamics of the economy.  $^{15}$ 

However, the use of *al-hiyal al-syar'iyyah* by Imam Abu Hanifah in resolving *fiqh* issues raises questions about the legitimacy and limits of its application, especially in the context of contemporary financial transactions. The application of *al-hiyal al-syar'iyyah* in modern financial contexts faces various issues and challenges. With the globalization

of the economy and rapid advancements in financial innovation, new practices in financial transactions often raise questions regarding legality and compliance with *sharī'ah* principles. In this regard, *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* plays a crucial role, but it also generates controversy. The application of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* requires a deep understanding of Islamic legal principles, as well as the Hanafī school's perspective, accompanied by a critical assessment of its impact and implications in practice.<sup>16</sup>

This study aims to analyze the concept of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* from the Ḥanafī school's perspective and explore its potential application in modern financial transactions (*muamalah māliyyah*). The research adopts an analytical-critical approach to the classical and contemporary literature on *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah*, focusing on the interpretation and application of this concept within the Ḥanafī school. The analysis will include an evaluation of the arguments for and against the use of *ḥiyal* and its implications for the development of contemporary Islamic law.

Based on the background presented, this research aims to examine two main aspects related to *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah*. First, it will explore the concept of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* from the perspective of the Ḥanafī school by examining the understanding and interpretation provided by this school regarding the legal techniques known as *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah*. Second, this study will analyze the application of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* in financial contracts (*mu'amalah māliyyah*), i.e., financial transactions in the context of *sharī'ah*. The focus is on identifying how the principles of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* are applied in various types of financial transactions and the extent to which their application aligns with the *sharī'ah* legal framework as regulated by the Ḥanafī school.

This research adopts a descriptive qualitative approach, <sup>17</sup>using the library research method to investigate the concept of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* within the Ḥanafī school's perspective and its application in financial transactions (*muamalah māliyyah*). This methodology aims to provide a deep understanding of the phenomenon being studied through the analysis of relevant literature.

The type of research applied is descriptive qualitative, focusing on an in-depth understanding of phenomena without involving statistical data. This study utilizes library research as the main method, involving the analysis of literature to build a theoretical foundation. The literature review is conducted by examining theories from relevant books and scholarly articles to understand the concept of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* and its application in *muamalah māliyyah*.

This research employs two main approaches. The normative approach <sup>18</sup> is used to understand *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* from an Islamic legal perspective by referring to the Qur'an, the hadiths of the Prophet Muhammad saw, and the opinions of scholars. This approach is important to assess the compliance of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* principles within the framework of Islamic law. Additionally, the sociological approach <sup>19</sup> is applied to analyze social phenomena related to the implementation of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* in

*muamalah* practices in society. This approach includes the study of social structures, interactions, and changes in *muamalah* practices.

Data in this research is obtained from two main sources. Primary sources include books that directly discuss *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* from the Ḥanafī school's perspective, such as *al-Makhārij fī al-Ḥiyal*, *al-Ḥiyal wa al-Taḥayyul fī al-Aḥkām al-Syar'iyyah*, and others. Secondary sources consist of additional literature, including scholarly journals, theses, and dissertations that provide explanations and analyses of primary sources. Data collection is conducted through literature review with several steps: first, acquiring and reading relevant literature; second, examining and sorting books according to their relevance to the research; third, translating necessary texts into Indonesian or English; and fourth, analyzing the selected material.

After the data is collected, the processing is done through the following steps: first, data identification, which involves reviewing the obtained data to ensure its relevance to the research discussion; second, data selection, which involves examining the collected data to meet the required data suitability; third, data clarification, which involves organizing the data systematically for easy understanding; fourth, data systematization, which involves structuring the data based on the discussion framework and analyzing it to draw conclusions; and fifth, conclusion drawing, which involves formulating conclusions deductively based on the analysis conducted.

In this study, several previous studies relevant to the topic "A Critical Analysis of the Concept of Al-Ḥiyal Al-Syar'iyyah within the Ḥanafī School Paradigm: Implications and Implementation in Contemporary Financial Transactions" have been reviewed to identify the contribution of this research in the existing academic context. These studies include:

- 1. A study by Gusniarti titled "Ḥīlah in Shariah Charged Card According to MUI Fatwa Number: 42/DSN MUI/V/2004" examines the legal status of ḥīlah in the context of the Shariah Charge Card based on the MUI fatwa. Although this type of research is a library study focused on the *fiqh* review of ḥīlah in the Charge Card, this research differs as Gusniarti's focus is limited to the application of ḥīlah in a specific context, discussing the Charge Card, while this study addresses the application of ḥīlah in *muamalah māliyyah* in general, with a Ḥanafī school perspective.
- 2. The second study, a thesis by Misbahul Munir titled "Analysis of the Practice of Hīlah in DSN MUI Murabaha Fatwa: Case Study at PT BPRS Syariah Tanmiya Artha Kediri," discusses the application of hīlah in Murabaha financing at PT BPRS Syariah Tanmiya Artha, focusing on the concept level. This research is a qualitative field study. The contribution of this research lies in the application of hīlah in financing practice, while this research focuses on the literature review of hīlah in *muamalah māliyyah* more broadly, including theoretical and practical analysis from the Ḥanafī school perspective.
- 3. The third study, a journal article by Elimartati titled "Ḥīlah al-Syarī'ah as an Effort to Achieve Maqāṣid Syarī'ah," discusses ḥīlah in the context of achieving maqāṣid syarī'ah, namely the five main objectives of the *sharī'ah*: the preservation of religion, life, lineage, wealth, and intellect. This research provides a general perspective on ḥīlah as an effort to achieve welfare. Unlike this study, which focuses on wealth preservation and the application of ḥīlah in the context of *muamalah māliyyah*, this research adds a new dimension to the study of *maqāṣid syarī'ah*.
- 4. The fourth study, a journal article by Muhamad Takhim titled "The Method of Ḥīlah (Legal Stratagem) in Contemporary Muamalah Fiqh," discusses the modification and

- application of the hīlah method in contemporary *muamalah fiqh*, highlighting the use of hīlah to derive legal rulings and develop contemporary practices. While this journal emphasizes the modification of the hīlah method, this study focuses on the analysis of the concept and application of hīlah in the context of classical and contemporary *fiqh* from the Ḥanafī school perspective.
- 5. The fifth study, a journal article by Syaugi Mubarak, Seff H. Badrian, and Zulpa Makiah titled "The Practice of Ḥiyal in the Field of Worship Fiqh, Muamalah, and Family Law in Banjar and Hulu Sungai Utara Districts," explores the practice of Ḥiyal in the fields of worship *fiqh*, *muamalah*, and family law. This research provides an overview of the motivation, forms, and procedures of Ḥiyal in the local context. This study limits its focus to Ḥiyal in *muamalah fiqh* from the Ḥanafī school perspective, offering a more targeted analysis compared to the broader scope.
- 6. The sixth study, a journal article by Moh. Imron Rosyadi titled "Ḥīlah al-Ḥukmī: A Study of the Development of Islamic Legal Theory," discusses ḥīlah as an alternative method in legal resolution, focusing on scholars' views on ḥīlah. This research explains Islamic legal theory related to ḥīlah. This study, however, specializes in the discussion of the method and application of ḥīlah according to the Ḥanafī school, providing deeper insights into the application of ḥīlah within a specific school of thought.
- 7. The seventh study, a journal article by Lutfi Nur Fadhilah titled "al-Ḥīlah al-Syar'iyyah and the Possibility of Its Application," elaborates on ḥīlah in detail, including its legal meaning and application in worship and *muamalah*. This research covers a comprehensive discussion of ḥīlah. This study focuses on the ḥīlah method from the Ḥanafī school perspective and its application in *muamalah māliyyah*, offering a more specific analysis within a more focused scope.

This research provides a significant contribution by emphasizing an in-depth analysis of the concept of *al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah* within the Ḥanafī school framework, its implications, and its application in contemporary financial transactions. Although previous studies have presented various perspectives on hīlah, this study expands the understanding of hīlah's application in the context of *muamalah māliyyah* with a specific approach from the Ḥanafī school perspective. This research aims to fill the gap in the existing literature by providing more structured and in-depth insights into the application of hiyal and exploring its relevance and application in contemporary financial practices, thereby offering valuable contributions both theoretically and practically.

### 2. DISCUSSION

# 2.1. Definition of al-Ḥiyal al-Syar'iyyah

Fiqh scholars have differing views on *al-ḥiyal* (tricks or stratagems), with some allowing it and others forbidding it, depending on how they interpret *ḥīlah*. *Al-ḥiyal* in Arabic is the plural form of *al-ḥīlah*, which means cleverness, analytical ability, and sharpness in response.<sup>20</sup> *Ḥiyal* refers to the intelligence in managing a matter and sharpness in analysis. *Ḥiyal* can be interpreted as a tactic or strategy used to avoid a law and switch to another law that does not contradict the *sharī'ah*.<sup>21</sup>

## 2.1.1 Definition of *al-Ḥiyal* According to Scholars

The definition of *al-hīlah* has been expressed by several scholars, including:

- 1. Al-Syātibī: Al-hiyal is the performance of an action that is outwardly permissible or prohibited with the intention of changing the law or avoiding a religious obligation.<sup>22</sup>
- Ibn Taimiyyah: Al-hiyal is an act that causes a change from one state to another or a hidden way that leads to its goal. A person will not achieve his goal except with cleverness and intelligence. If the goal is good, then it is a good *hīlah*, and if the goal is bad, then it is a bad hīlah.23
- Al-Ḥamawī: Al-ḥiyal is one way to release oneself from a religious burden that one is afflicted with.24
- 4. Ibn Ḥajar al-'Asqalānī: Al-ḥiyal is something that leads to the intended goal through a hidden path.<sup>25</sup>

#### 2.1.2 Classification of al-Hiyal

The classification of *hīlah* based on its permissibility is as follows:

# Al-Ḥiyal al-Muḥarramah<sup>26</sup>

Al-Hiyal al-Muharramah or forbidden hiyal is an action that outwardly appears permissible but is intended to nullify sharī'ah law or change it into another law that contradicts the maqāṣid syarī'ah. The types of forbidden hiyal include: Using hidden means that lead to prohibited actions, tricks to avoid obligations that have been imposed, tricks to avoid what causes an obligation, and tricks to take someone else's right or harm someone through deceit.

# 2. Al-Hiyal al-Jāizah (al-Makhārij al-Masyrū'ah)<sup>27</sup>

Al-Hiyal al-Jāizah, also known as al-Makhārij al-Masyrū'ah, is a lawful method pursued when there is a valid reason that aligns with the magāsid syarī'ah. The types of permissible *hiyal* include:

- a. Hiyal to achieve a legally sanctioned goal through a method established by the sharī'ah.
- b. Hiyal to achieve a legally sanctioned goal through a permissible but not yet established method, which can lead to the goal secretly.

The classification of hīlah based on speech and actions is as follows:

# 1. Hīlah in Speech

*Ḥīlah* that involves speech requires intellect for its establishment, and therefore, the presence of intention is a prerequisite. Sometimes, a hīlah in speech is valid (ṣaḥīḥ) if it produces certain effects, which in turn allows the associated ruling to be applied. However, it can also be invalid (fasid) if it produces no effect, and thus, the ruling does not apply. An example of hilah in speech is the statement, "I sell this item to you for 1 million on credit (deferred payment), and then I will buy it back from you for 800 thousand in cash." This represents a strategy to disguise usury as a legitimate

sale. Another example is the practice of renaming something forbidden with a different term to make it appear permissible, such as calling intoxicating liquor (khamar) by another name to justify its consumption.<sup>28</sup>

#### 2. *Hīlah* in Action

Ḥīlah that involves actions occurs when a person intentionally engages in behavior with a purpose that contradicts the principles of Shariah. Examples include traveling with the intention of shortening prayers (qasr) or breaking the fast, or traveling in the summer to delay fasting, intending to make up or complete the fast in winter. Actions that are originally permissible can become forbidden if the intention behind them is to achieve something prohibited.<sup>29</sup>

#### 2.2. Al-Ḥiyal al-Syar'iyyah According to the Ḥanafī School

Imam Abu Hanifah is one of the scholars who permits  $h\bar{\imath}lah$ . The Ḥanafī school is the school of fiqh that most extensively uses hiyal. However, not all hiyal are permitted according to them.<sup>30</sup>

# 2.2.1 Definition of al-Hiyal al-Syar'iyyah According to the Hanafi School

Al-Ḥiyal al-Syar'iyyah is a lawful tactic, strategy, or plan with a lawful means and an intention or goal that aligns with the sharī'ah.<sup>31</sup> Al-Ḥiyal is one of the principles of the Ḥanafī school, which defines ḥiyal as a way out of difficulties or the diversion of a law or the annulment of that law with another law.<sup>32</sup>

Al-Ḥiyal developed among the figures of the Ḥanafī school. Al-ḥiyal in the Ḥanafī school is not used to oppose sharī'ah law but as a way out or solution in a matter as long as it does not contradict sharī'ah law. Al-Ḥiyal from the Ḥanafī school's perspective is something that can achieve the truth and align with the maqāṣid al-syar'iyyah. Thus, hiyal is not intended to achieve something forbidden but as a facilitation and leniency. Therefore, hiyal according to them is interpreted as a way out. Ḥiyal is a strategy to avoid sharī'ah provisions; this strategy is not seen as a violation of the law. This strategy is used to overcome difficulties in a problem but is not intended as a means to avoid Islamic legal provisions.<sup>33</sup>

One of the Ḥanafī school scholars, *al-Ḥamawī*, argues that *ḥiyal* is something that can release a person from the shackles of *sharī'ah* law for those who are tested with religious matters. Or a way to free oneself from religious matters without violating *sharī'ah*, so it is called a strategy or trick. The Ḥanafī school scholars consider this a *makhārij* or way out of a problem and religious matter.<sup>34</sup>

 $Al ext{-}Sarkhasar{\imath}$ , one of the Ḥanafī school scholars, explains the law of  $har{\imath}lah$  that  $har{\imath}lah$  in laws that can release from sin is allowed according to the majority of scholars. However, it is disliked by some who deviate from the truth because of their ignorance and lack of analysis of the Qur'an and the Sunnah.  $Al ext{-}har{\imath}lah$  that can release a person from

the forbidden or lead them to the lawful is good, and it is only disliked if *hīlah* is applied to someone's right to nullify it or to falsify falsehood or to a right that involves suspicion.<sup>35</sup>

Abū Bakr al-Jassās from the Ḥanafī school argues that hīlah that leads to the permissible and obtains a right is allowed.<sup>36</sup>

*Hīlah* in the view of most scholars is something that has a negative connotation; the term is often understood as an attempt to take a hidden path to achieve a goal that is reprehensible according to religion, reason, or folkways.<sup>37</sup> They view *hīlah* as a diversion of the law, which is akin to changing a law that has been established by sharī'ah. The Hanafī school scholars view hīlah as a way out or solution to a problem that does not violate *sharī'ah*.<sup>38</sup>

# 2.2.2 Classification of *al-Hiyal* According to the Hanafi School

Most figh scholars from the Hanafī school divide *hīlah* into two parts; the first is  $h\bar{l}$  that is allowed by the sharī'ah, and the second is  $h\bar{l}$  that is not allowed by the sharī'ah, depending on the method used to achieve the hīlah. Every hīlah used by someone to nullify another's right or create suspicion or to conceal a lie is a disliked *hīlah*. However,  $h\bar{\imath}lah$  used by someone to free themselves from something forbidden or to achieve something lawful is a good and permitted *hīlah*.<sup>39</sup>

Wahbah al-Zuhailī classifies  $h\bar{\imath}lah$  based on the purpose of performing  $h\bar{\imath}lah$ . According to Wahbah al-Zuhailī, *hīlah* is divided into two:<sup>40</sup>

#### a. Permissible *hīlah syar'iyyah*

Hiyal that occurs in the substance of sharī'ah law established for a particular issue and used in other conditions to establish the truth or reject injustice or to obtain ease due to necessity. This type of *hiyal* does not damage or destroy the interests of *sharī'ah*.

#### b. Forbidden *hīlah syar 'iyyah*

Hiyal that aims to change the substance of sharī'ah law into another law that is valid outwardly but is in vain inwardly.

Hiyal can be allowed or forbidden depending on the purpose for which hiyal is performed. If the purpose is to establish the truth or obtain ease, then this *hiyal* is allowed as long as it does not contradict the  $maq\bar{a}$  sid syar $\bar{i}$  ah. However, if the purpose is to nullify sharī'ah law or hiyal performed does not align with maqāṣid syarī'ah and leads to something forbidden, then this hiyal is forbidden. Hiyal can become obligatory if it is done to prevent harm or loss.<sup>41</sup>

In general, scholars, both from the Ḥanafī school and others, allow hiyal if the method used and the goal to be achieved does not violate sharī'ah. Ḥiyal is allowed if used to avoid the forbidden and avoid sin or allowed as long as it does not contradict

maqāṣid al-syar'iyyah. Hiyal is disliked and can even be forbidden if its purpose is to nullify someone's right or hiyal on falsehood.

# 2.2.3 Legal Basis of the Hanafi School in Permitting al-Hiyal al-Syar'iyyah

The Ḥanafī school allows the application of hiyal in sharī'ah law. They use the following texts as evidence to justify *hiyal*:

- a. Evidence from the Qur'an<sup>42</sup>
  - 1. The incident of Prophet Ayyūb as. narrated by Allah SWT in His words in Q.S. Sād/38: 44:

"And take in your hand a bunch [of grass] and strike with it and do not break your oath. Indeed, We found him patient, an excellent servant. Indeed, he was one repeatedly turning back [to Allah]".43

The commentators say that Ayyūb, in his suffering and illness, once became angry with his wife for some reason and swore that if Allah healed him, he would lash her 100 times. After he was healed by Allah and his wife had become righteous and good to him, Allah commanded him to strike her with a bunch of 100 blades of grass in one blow, thus fulfilling his oath.<sup>44</sup> This verse explains that every oath that has been uttered must still be fulfilled. However, due to a change in circumstances that made the oath difficult to fulfill, Allah provided a solution to fulfill the oath in another way.<sup>45</sup>

The change in the form of fulfilling the oath indicates that *hiyal* exists in religious teachings. The diversion of the law (striking 100 times) to another law that is lighter (striking with a bunch of grass) is an act of *hiyal*.<sup>46</sup>

Based on this evidence, the Hanafi school uses it as a precedent for all similar cases with the same reasoning through the method of *qiyās*. This evidence also names their theory al-makhārij min al-maḍā'iq (the way out of difficulties).47

2. The story of Prophet Yūsuf as. narrated by Allah SWT in His words in Q.S. Yūsuf/12: 70:

"So when he had furnished them with their supplies, he put the drinking cup into the bag of his brother. Then an announcer called out, 'O caravan, indeed you are thieves". 48

"So when he had furnished them with their supplies," meaning he gave them their rations, including Bunyamin. "Yusuf placed the drinking cup" — the vessel used for drinking and measuring — "into the bag of his brother," they placed it among their belongings. When

they were about to leave, "someone called out, 'O caravan, indeed you are thieves," as if the caller did not know the truth.<sup>49</sup>

What Prophet Yusuf did to keep his brother with him by placing the drinking vessel made of gold into Bunyamin's bag was to protect Bunyamin from the harm that his brothers, who had once harmed him, might do.<sup>50</sup> The strategy used by Prophet Yusuf in this story is evidence of the permissibility of *hiyal*. Prophet Yusuf performed *hiyal* to keep his brother Bunyamin with him to protect him from the intentions (evil) of his brothers.<sup>51</sup>

This strategy is a form of *hiyal syar'iyyah* that led Prophet Yusuf to a good goal. This strategy is a form of *hiyal syar'iyyah* that led to welfare and provided religious benefits. What Prophet Yusuf did in this story was a legitimate way that did not contradict the *maqāṣid syarī'ah*, and it was divine inspiration given by Allah SWT to some of His servants in matters that are encouraged, permitted, or required to achieve a good goal.<sup>52</sup>

3. Allah's words regarding those who are oppressed and helpless and do not know the way (to migrate) in Q.S. al-Nisā'/4: 98:

"Except for the oppressed among men, women, and children who cannot devise a plan nor are they directed to a way".53

This noble verse provides evidence that if someone cannot perform a command or otherwise, then they are excused, as Allah says for those unable to perform jihad.<sup>54</sup>

The word *hīlah* in this verse is interpreted as a way out, a method, or a loophole. Allah SWT forgives them (the oppressed) because of their backwardness and helplessness. They cannot find a way to free themselves from the hands of the disbelievers, and that strategy is prohibited. Therefore, it is known that *hiyal* that saves someone from something forbidden is commendable (*mustaḥab*) and permissible.<sup>55</sup>

*Ḥiyal* in this verse is meant as a strategy to free oneself from the hands of the disbelievers. For example, using a strategy by uttering words of disbelief under compulsion is permissible to protect oneself. *Ḥiyal* in this verse is if their path is blocked and hindered by the polytheists, then they are ordered to migrate to the Prophet Muhammad to uphold the symbols of religion. This is a commendable *ḥiyal* that earns a reward from Allah SWT.<sup>56</sup>

- b. Evidence from the Sunnah of the Prophet Muhammad
  - 1. The hadith from Abū Hurairah and Abū Sa'īd al-Khudrī ra.:

"Narrated by Abū Sa'īd al-Khudrī and Abū Hurairah ra. The Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, appointed a man over Khaybar, who brought him fine dates. The Messenger of Allah (PBUH) asked, "Are all the dates of Khaybar like this?" He replied, "No, by Allah, O Messenger of Allah, we take one sa' of this (fine quality) for two sa' of ordinary dates, and two sa' of it for three." The Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw then said, "Do not do that. Sell all of the dates for dirhams, then buy fine dates with the dirhams" (Narrated by al-Bukhārī)."

This hadith explains that the Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw. instructed to sell the dates for dirhams or for trade goods. Then the dirhams were used to buy fine dates. This is an example of *hiyal*. 58 *Ḥiyal* in this hadith aims to avoid riba. 59

The practice of *hilah* also occurred during the time of the Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, as narrated by Abū Sa'īd al-Khudrī and Abū Hurairah ra., in which the Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, forbade bartering one sa' of Khaybar dates for two sa' of ordinary dates or two sa' of Khaybar dates for three sa' of ordinary dates to avoid riba. He then created a *hilah* by selling the Khaybar dates for dirhams, which were then used to buy fine dates.<sup>60</sup>

2. The hadith from 'Abdullāh ibn Buraidah:

"Narrated by 'Abdullāh ibn Buraidah: The Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, said, 'I will not leave the mosque until I tell you a verse or, he said, a surah that has not been revealed to a prophet after Solomon except to me.' Then he walked, and I followed him until he reached the door of the mosque, where he stepped one foot out while the other remained inside the mosque. I said to myself, 'Did he forget?' Then he turned to me and said, 'What do you start the recitation with when you begin the prayer?' I said, 'With

(Bismillāhirrahmānirrahīm).' He said, 'That is it,' and then he exited. (Narrated by Dāruqutnī)."

In this hadith, it is narrated that the Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw was asked about the greatest verse in the Qur'an. He said that he would not leave the mosque until he informed the questioner of that verse. The Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, informed him about the verse after stepping one foot out of the mosque, even though he had promised to convey the information before leaving the mosque. This can serve as evidence that a person is not considered to have entered by merely stepping one foot inside, and is not considered to have exited by merely stepping one foot outside. This hadith indicates the permissibility of *ḥilah* in taking an oath. Based on this hadith, it can be understood that if someone takes an oath not to do something and then wants to free himself from that oath or does not want to break it, he can do part of it, and it will not be considered breaking his oath. Sa

# 2.3. The Application of al-Ḥiyal al-Syar'iyyah in Financial Contracts (Muamalah Māliyyah)

Hilah is considered a special method or strategy for creating welfare. This method involves using the law intelligently to achieve a justified goal. Hilah is a way out or solution to a problem as long as it does not contradict sharī'ah law. The method of hilah is widely applied in the field of muamalah, especially in financial transactions (muamalah māliyyah), due to the emergence of new issues resulting from the advancement of civilization and technology. Thus, the method of hilah is needed to solve these problems in the form of legal modifications that do not violate sharī'ah. Hilah in the field of muamalah māliyyah is applied to meet the needs of society in achieving welfare. This method is used to solve social problems or avoid prohibited acts. The following are examples of the application of hilah syar'iyyah in financial contracts (muamalah māliyyah):

#### 1. Hīlah in Sales Contracts

Is allowed in sales contracts to avoid problems. *Ḥilah* in sales contracts is a solution to avoid harm or detriment. For example, Person A instructs Person B to buy a house for 1,000 dirhams from Person C, and he will buy the house from Person B for 1,100 dirhams. Person B is concerned that Person A might change his mind and not buy the house, leaving him unable to cancel the sale with the first seller. Therefore, the *ḥilah* is that Person B buys the house with an option of three days or more. Then, he informs Person A that he has bought the house as instructed. If Person A does not want to buy it, he can return it to the seller using the option. To avoid problems, he buys the house with an option and if Person A does not want to buy it, he can return the house to the seller. If Person A does not want to buy it unless he also has an option, the *ḥilah* is to give Person A an option that is shorter than the option provided by the seller, so that he can cancel the purchase if Person A does not want to buy the house.<sup>65</sup>

a. Ḥīlah in Sales Contracts (Salam Contract)

A salam contract is a sales contract in which the delivery of the goods is deferred, and the payment is made in advance, with the goods delivered at a later date. Alternatively, it is a sales contract that advances payment and defers the goods.<sup>66</sup>

The *hilah* in a salam contract is to compel the buyer to avoid harm. For example, if the ordered goods have arrived at the agreed time and the owner refuses to accept them, he can be compelled to accept them. Or if they arrive before the agreed time, but the owner seems inclined to reject the goods, and the rejection could harm the goods, such as perishables like fruit or meat that need to be consumed, or livestock that need food, then the owner can be compelled to accept them. <sup>67</sup>

# b. *Hīlah* in the Exchange of New Currency

Before the Eid al-Fitr celebration, many Indonesians rush to exchange their money for new currency. During the Eid celebration in Indonesia, it is customary to give envelopes containing new currency to relatives, especially children. However, this currency exchange becomes a complex problem as some consider it a form of riba. The *hilah* in the exchange of new currency can be done through an *ijarah* contract (lease agreement), i.e., a contract between the lessor and lessee for money exchange services from the bank. The fee paid to the lessor is compensation for the service provided to the lessee, not compensation for the value of the money. For example, someone exchanges Rp. 120,000 for new currency totaling Rp. 100,000, which falls under the category of riba. To avoid the practice of riba, the *hilah* is done by using an *ijarah* contract, where the exchange of money with a certain amount includes an *ijarah* and is not considered riba. The way to do this is by buying Rp. 100,000 of new currency with Rp. 100,000 of old currency. Then, paying Rp. 20,000 as a service fee for the exchange. The service fee for exchanging money is considered an *ijarah* and not riba.

c. Shopping on the GO-JEK Application with COD Payment System (Cash on Delivery)

GO-JEK is a technology company that provides transportation services through motorcycle taxis. GO-JEK is a booking service through the GO-JEK application on Android. By shopping with this service, customers can buy all their needs without leaving home. GO-JEK will purchase all the needed items and deliver them to the customer's location. GO-JEK will initially lend money to the customer, and the customer is required to repay the money with an additional transportation fee after receiving the ordered goods.<sup>69</sup> The COD payment system involves the buyer paying for the order in cash to the courier upon delivery <sup>70</sup>

In this case, the motorcycle taxi driver initially lends money to the customer to purchase the items, then charges the customer for the items plus the transportation fee from the

place where the items were purchased to the customer's location. There are two transactions combined in this case: a loan transaction (*qard*) in which the driver lends money to the customer, and a lease agreement (*ijarah*) in which the driver rents out his services to deliver the items to the customer, who will later pay the driver according to the normal rate without any additional fee.<sup>71</sup> This transaction is prohibited by the Prophet Muhammad saw:

"Narrated by 'Abdullāh ibn 'Amr: The Messenger of Allah (PBUH) said: 'It is not lawful to combine a loan and a sale.' (Narrated by Abū Dāwud)."

The Messenger of Allah (PBUH) prohibited combining a loan and a sale. The sale in this case refers to a service sale. Some scholars allow the GO-JEK transaction because it is needed, especially in big cities where traffic congestion is common, and it helps customers meet their needs without sacrificing time and effort. However, some scholars forbid this transaction because it combines a loan and a sale, which is prohibited according to the hadith of the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH). To make this transaction lawful, a strategy or *hilah* is required. The *hilah* is to change the transaction into a sale. The driver (courier) buys the ordered items directly from the store and then sells them to the customer with an additional transportation fee. The driver and the customer agree in advance that the customer must buy the ordered items so that the driver is not disadvantaged.

### d. Hilah in Lease Agreements

Leasing is a transaction involving the rental of goods or services in exchange for compensation. For example, in a rental transaction involving a house, the contract is made between the homeowner and the tenant, where the tenant provides compensation to the homeowner.<sup>75</sup>

The *hilah* in lease agreements, for example, occurs when someone rents a house for several years. The tenant fears that the landlord may excuse himself, so the tenant makes the initial year's payment small and sets a larger payment for the last year to avoid a loss if the lease is canceled before the end of the term and he cannot recover his money. The tenant fears that the agreement will be canceled due to the landlord's death, involvement in debt, or bankruptcy, and he cannot recover his money. The *ḥilah* is to make the previous year's payments small so that if the contract is canceled before the agreed time, he is not bound by a payment that disadvantages him, and the landlord is discouraged from canceling the agreement for fear of losing the large payment in the final year.<sup>76</sup>

e. Hilah in the Ijarah Muntahiyah bi al-Tamlīk (IMBT) Contract

The IMBT contract is a lease agreement that ends with the transfer of ownership,<sup>77</sup> *Ijarah* is a transaction involving the use of something beneficial or a contract to obtain the benefits of an object. It means renting something to derive benefits from it without transferring ownership rights. Most people want to purchase something expensive but do not have enough money, so they choose to buy it on credit. A credit purchase is a sales transaction in which the payment is made in installments over a certain period agreed upon by the parties. Credit purchases may involve riba. The extension of the payment period results in the item's price being higher than the price at the time of the transaction. Therefore, contract engineering is needed.<sup>78</sup>

The contract engineered in IMBT is an *ijarah* contract (lease) with an additional sales or gift contract. The *hilah* in the IMBT contract involves an *ijarah* contract with an initial promise at the beginning of the contract about the transfer of ownership after the lease period ends. Therefore, IMBT begins with an *ijarah* contract and ends with a sales or gift contract. Because the sales or gift contract becomes the basis for full ownership of the leased object. For example, someone wants to buy a house worth Rp. 200,000,000 but does not have enough money to pay for it, and this can be done on credit. To avoid the practice of riba, the purchase is made by renting the house and making an agreement to own the house fully after the *ijarah* period ends through a sales or gift contract, and the principal price is fulfilled during the *ijarah* period. He pays rent every month of about Rp. 17,000,000, so that when the lease period ends, he can own the house through a sales or gift contract. This contract engineering is done to achieve welfare and avoid the practice of riba.

#### f. Hilah in the Ownership of Used Taxi Vehicles for Taxi Drivers

Some transportation companies offer a program for installment ownership of used taxi vehicles for their taxi drivers. The purpose of this program is to provide drivers with the option to own a car at a low price. Most people want to own a car at an affordable price but do not have enough money to buy the car. By participating in this program, the taxi car can become fully owned by the driver according to the agreed contract. This program involves installments deducted from the driver's monthly bonus. With this monthly bonus deduction, the driver can save to buy the car. This case is similar to the IMBT contract, where the lease ends with the transfer of ownership, in this case, a lease of services. For example, someone wants to own a taxi car worth Rp. 80,000,000; he participates in this program by becoming a driver for five years (according to the contract). The driver buys the car through monthly installment payments deducted from the driver's monthly bonus. The ownership of the taxi car can be transferred to the driver after the installment period ends. The *hilah* in this transaction involves a contract that

begins with an *ijarah* contract (lease of services) and ends with a sales contract, resulting in the full transfer of ownership of the taxi car to the driver.<sup>80</sup>

# g. Hilah Syar'iyyah for Someone Who Does Not Have Heirs

Some scholars allow bequeathing more than a third of the inheritance with the consent of the heirs, as narrated in the hadith of the Prophet Muhammad saw, from Amrū ibn Khārijah:

"Narrated by Amrū ibn Khārijah: The Messenger of Allah Muhammad saw, said: There is no will for an heir except that other heirs allow it. (Narrated by Dāruquṭnī)."

If the heirs agree, the will recipient receives the portion as agreed by the other heirs. The consent of the heirs in this matter is equivalent to giving up their right to the will. If there are no heirs, then consent is not needed. If there are heirs, the person may not bequeath all his property. He may bequeath more than a third of his property if the heirs agree. However, for someone who does not have heirs, a *hilah* can be done by bequeathing all his property for good causes. The *hilah* in this matter does not destroy the original law and does not contradict *maṣlaḥah syar'iyyah*, so it is not prohibited. The prohibition referred to is the squandering of wealth, and to avoid this, it is recommended for those without heirs to donate all their property for good causes.<sup>82</sup>

# h. Hilah in Sulh (Peace Agreement)

Sulh is a contract to settle disputes and eliminate enmity <sup>83</sup> Sulh dapat diartikan sebagai peace agreement on a matter. For example, someone agrees with a debtor on the condition that he can postpone the payment of the debt as long as the debtor pledges his property until a certain time. If the debtor refuses to do so, there is no peace (sulh) between them, and the debtor must pay the debt immediately. The hilah is that the guarantor must be present to guarantee the debt so that it can be postponed. If the guarantor is not present, the hilah is to make peace based on the debtor pledging his property until a specific time. <sup>84</sup>

If the debtor does not pay his debt, then another person who guarantees the property, and the property becomes a replacement that will be taken by the creditor. The strategy is permissible as long as the guarantor is present at the time of the agreement because he guarantees and bears the risk in the future. However, if the guarantor cannot be present, the strategy or *ḥilah* is to make peace on the grounds that the debtor will pledge his property but only until a specific time. 85

#### i. *Hilah* to Avoid *Harām* Caused by the Creditor

Basically, the debt must be paid immediately, and delaying or extending the payment period is something new, not a fixed matter. Therefore, the deferment of payment can only be determined by setting prior conditions as in the case of the *khiyār*. If someone has a deferred debt, and the creditor demands that he acknowledges the debt, while he fears that by acknowledging the debt, he will be asked to pay it immediately and deny the deferment, then the *ḥilah* is to ask the creditor whether the debt he is acknowledging is a debt that must be paid immediately or a deferred debt? If the creditor says that the debt is a deferred debt, then there is no demand for immediate payment. If the creditor says that the debt must be paid immediately, he can deny it by saying that he does not have a debt (that must be paid immediately), and he is not sinful for denying it.<sup>86</sup>

# j. Hilah in the *Ḥawālah* Contract

According to the Ḥanafī scholars, ḥawālah is the transfer of debt responsibility from the first party to a third party who has the obligation to pay it.<sup>87</sup> It is the transfer of the debt collection from the debtor to the party who bears the debt. The ḥilah for the person whose debt is transferred to another person is, for example, if the debtor transfers his debt to another person, and he fears that the property will disappear in the hands of the person who receives the transfer. Therefore, he cannot claim the original debtor (muḥūl) because the transfer of debt results in the transfer of the right.

In this case, there are several *hilah* or strategies that can be applied, including:

- 1. First *hilah*: The debtor says that he does not transfer the debt but becomes the creditor's representative to collect or receive the payment; if he receives it, he must settle the matter with the creditor.
- 2. Second *hilah*: The creditor sets a condition that if his money is lost, he will return to claim the original debtor.
- 3. Third *hilah*: The creditor says to the third party (who bears the debt): "Guarantee the debt that my debtor owes me," and he is satisfied with it as a substitute for the transfer of debt. If the third party provides a guarantee, then he can claim one of them. This is the best and most wise *hilah*.<sup>88</sup>

#### 3. CONCLUSION

- 1. Al-Ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah is a controversial source of Islamic law among scholars. The Hanafi school is particularly known for employing al-ḥiyal al-syar'iyyah as a method of legal determination, often referred to as strategies or tricks. Hanafi scholars view this as a makhārij or a way out of legal dilemmas. Ḥīlah is divided into two categories: prohibited and permissible (ḥīlah syar'iyyah). The permissibility of ḥīlah depends on its intended purpose. If the aim is to establish truth or facilitate matters, then ḥīlah is permissible as long as it does not contradict the objectives of Islamic law. However, if the purpose is to nullify Islamic law or if the ḥīlah is contrary to the objectives of Islamic law and leads to something prohibited, then it is forbidden.
- 2. The method of *hīlah* is applied in the field of *muamalah* as a solution to overcome difficulties and achieve benefits. It can be applied to various contracts such as sale, rent, debt, gift, and Islamic mortgage. *Ḥīlah* can be applied to both classical and contemporary *muamalah* transactions.
